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INTRODUCTION

This morning we are going to begin a series on Marriage & the Family from a Biblical perspective. Fair warning we are going to go places in this series that many will not dare go for fear it will be uncomfortable for either the speaker or the listener, but go there we shall. VI. The Stress of Marriage

- A. Many factors play into how a marriage can become stressed or distressed.
- B. How we learn to recognize what causes our marriage to be stressed, and how we learn to deal with that stress has everything to do with the atmosphere and attitude of our marriage. It is the key to a happy marriage.
- C. A happy marriage is not without difficulty; it's in the handling of the difficulties.
- D. Many boast of long marriages, but they weren't always happy marriages. A happy marriage is based in how you handle the stress and grow from it. The best of both worlds is a happy and long marriage.
- E. To recognize or deal with an issue within a marriage, one must have a sense of awareness which sadly in our busy life of today is dwindling within the home.
- F. Awareness is having a keen sense of the reality around you.
- G. Many in marriage don't think beyond our noses.
- H. Many spouses are simply unaware of the needs of their spouse because they haven't stayed aware or become aware of those needs until there is an explosive outburst or event.

- I. Most spouses live clueless.
- J.. Problems within a marriage are rarely overnight. They normally are the end result of a string of events, or lack thereof, where needs are not met and hardly ever talked about.
- K. What are major causes that create a stressful marriage?
- Loss of personal identity. Our personal identity is found in Christ which together gives our marriage an identity in Christ, but sadly when our identity becomes about the other person problems begin to take place.
 - Lack of communication – many assume they are good at communication when they are awful.
 - Lack in understanding in how to disagree in a healthy way.
 - Lack of our needs being met.
 - Frustrations building up and coming out sideways.
 - Lack of having a place to belong.
 - Failure to let things go.
 - Forgiveness is a rarity.

Ephesians 4:26-27

Be angry and do not sin. Don't let the sun go down on your anger, and don't give the Devil an opportunity.

Colossians 3:12-14 (ESV)

“Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony.”

- K. Ways to overcome the stress of marriage
- Learn patience; see things the way God sees them.
 - Learn kindness; treat the situation how God would treat it.
 - Learn gentleness; be extra careful to give room for others.
 - Learn forgiveness; be forgiving in light of God's forgiveness.
 - Learn to communicate; learn to articulate yourself.
 - Learn to be open to listen to the other. The number one key to becoming a good communicator is listening.

Mortimer Adler (paraphrase)

The key essential part of closing the communication cycle is listening. We learn to read and write in our elementary years and speak in high school and university, but never are we taught to listen.

- Be honest about your contributions to the point of the contingency.
- Be “real” before you seek to be “right”.
- Be open & introspective to your own life.
- Be willing to change and then take action to do so.
- Seek professional help when necessary.
- Be liberal with forgiveness without being naïve.
- Be intentional to love.
